

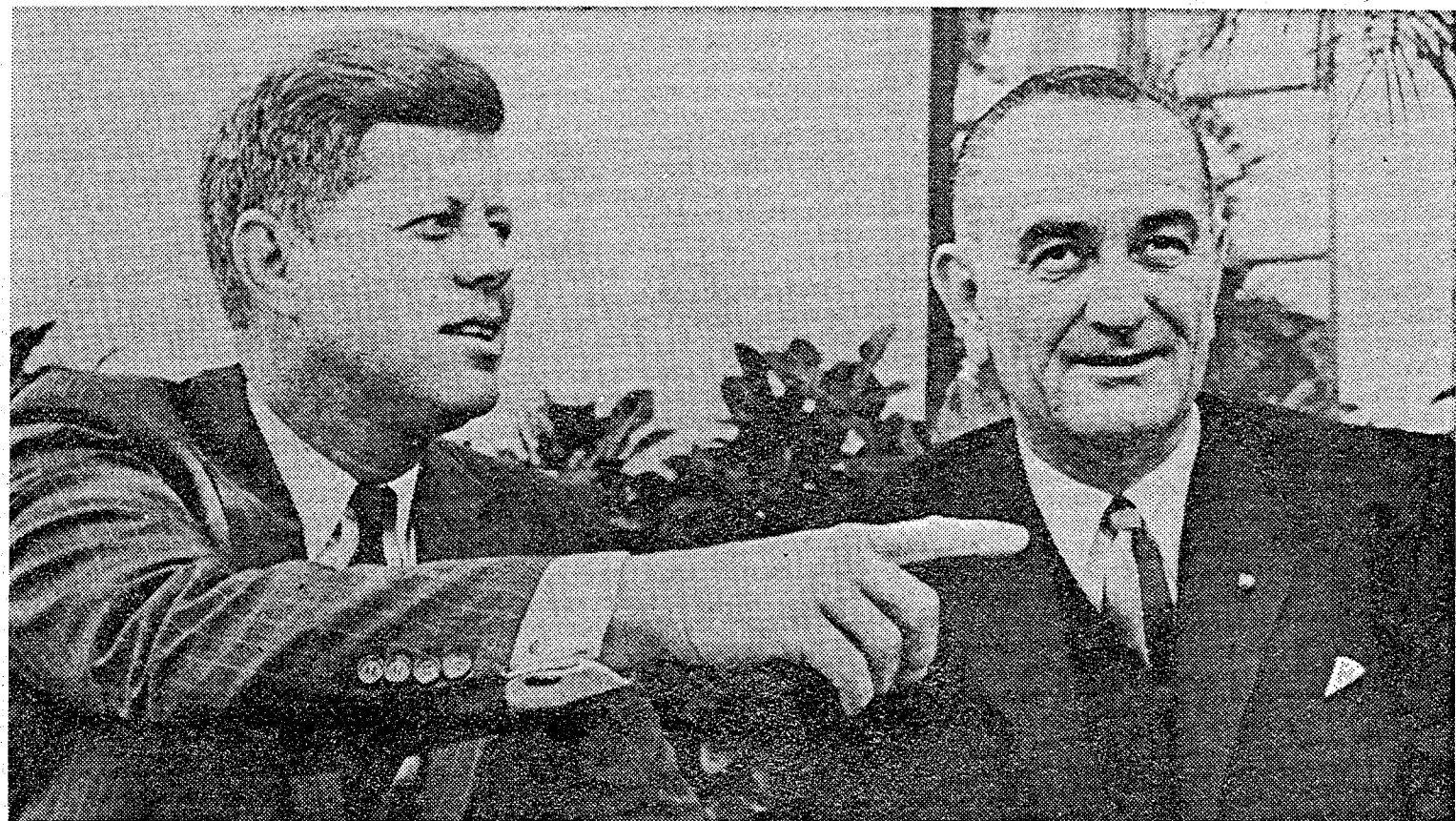
# HE LIVED FOR FREEDOM, AMERICA, AND HIS FAMILY

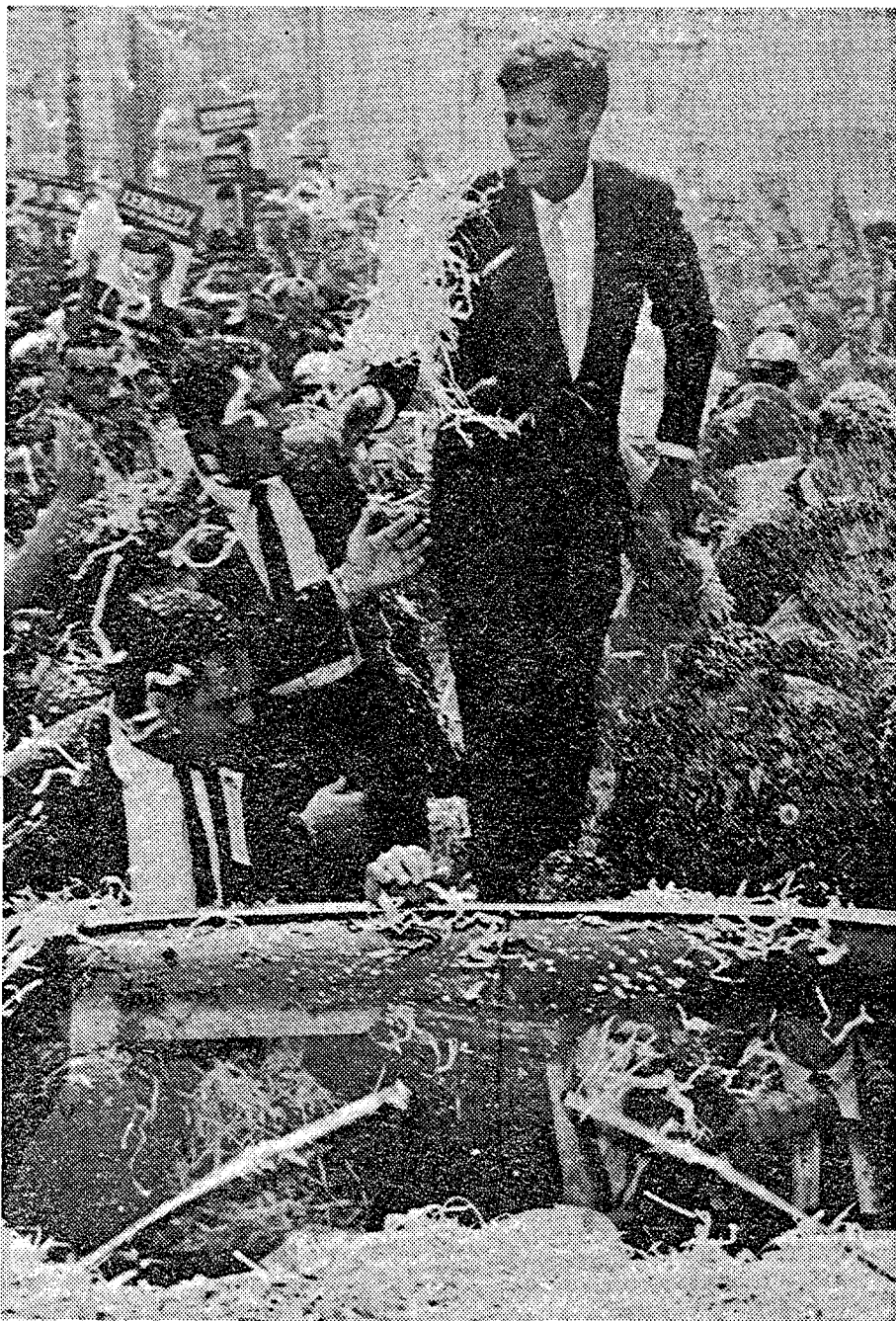

## HIS SHORT TERM ACHIEVED MUCH



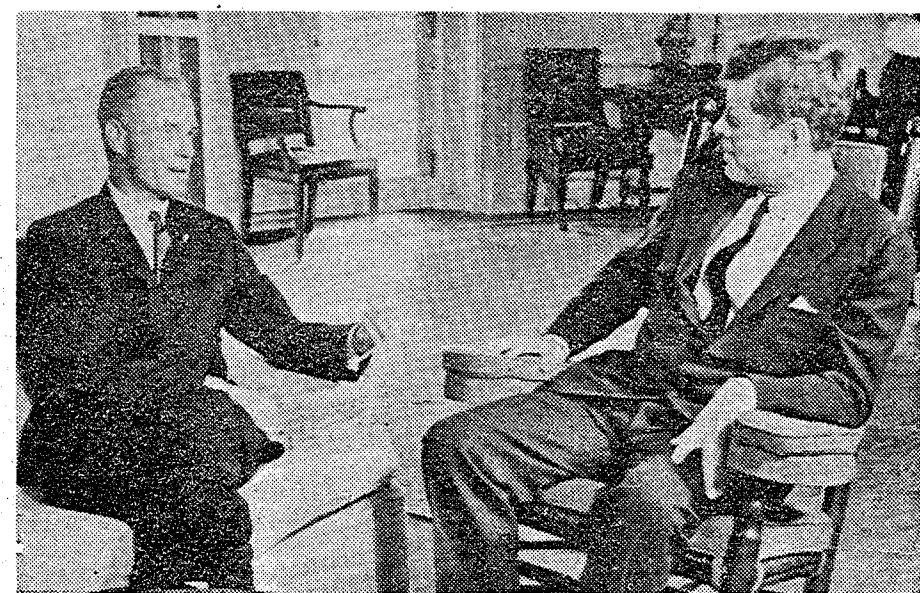
After his election to the Presidency in November, 1960, Mr Kennedy is deluged with confetti and paper streamers in Los Angeles.
